

Be a part of Rotary's legacy in Bozeman at the Glen Lake Rotary Park



Vision

Rotarians are committed to service and are not afraid to dream big or solve big problems. A community space that promotes social bonds, especially in nature, will function for the betterment of our growing city. This new recreational pavilion will be constructed in the most multi-use park in the city, and it is being built by the two Bozeman Rotary clubs to celebrate our Centennial. This gathering space will be used by local people of all ages and abilities year-round as part of a City-approved master plan to upgrade the Glen Lake Rotary Park over the next few years. The pavilion is designed to promote interaction and beautification in this recreational space that is linked to a number of community trails. The park is and will be an ever-evolving work that anticipates and responds to the needs and well-being of our community. The pavilion is a public space available for up to 50 people to rent from the city for family reunions, weddings, birthday parties, and more for years to come.





Composed of alternating concave and convex steel plates, the roof will funnel water to a central opening through which a tree will grow.



Sunlight will filter through the partially open roof to seating areas, tables, and a gathering space for all to enjoy.



History

Bozeman's Noon Rotary Club was charted in 1920, and then in 1992 chartered the Bozeman Sunrise Club. One of the first projects that Bozeman volunteers began was to rehabilitate a local gravel pit into a thriving community park officially known as the East Gallatin Recreation Area. As the 100-year anniversary of the chartering of Bozeman's first Rotary club approaches, both rotary clubs are collaborating to build a city managed pavilion that all residents can use. The pavilion will be placed in the former Gallatin Recreation Area, recently renamed Glen Lake Rotary Park.



The Pavilion

The pavilion design for Glen Lake Rotary Park incorporates many Rotary themes and ideals in a useful gathering space for the community. The 52-foot diameter roof is composed of alternating concave and convex steel sections. The design allows light to be filtered through, and water to be channeled to a central opening through which a tree will rise above the roof, to embrace the natural setting. The circular pavilion also echoes the wagon-wheel shape that has long symbolized the Rotary Organization. Originally drawn with a few lines showing dust and motion, the wheel shape was said to illustrate civilization and movement. Other Rotary themes will be incorporated into surrounding features and signage, which will feature Glen Lake Rotary Park's new name.

GLEN LAKE ROTARY PARK OFFERS FREE ACCESS FOR ALL AGES TO THESE AMENITIES:

- A sand beach that will be expanded to accommodate more people in a swimming space.
- Indoor restroom, shower, event kitchen, & changing facility.
- Dock with paved patio, picnic tables, and sunshade.
- Non-motorized boating on Glen Lake.
- Sand volleyball court (to be expanded to three courts).
- Winter recreation including ice skating, fat-tire biking, cross country skiing, & ice fishing
- Extensive trail system.
- Climbing rock.
- Paved entrances, parking and additional multi-use trails.

Construction & Future

The first phase of construction includes infrastructure for the park and pavilion, a monument, and construction of the pavilion. The estimated cost of this phase is \$197,980 with anticipated donations of work and supplies by numerous local contractors and retailers.

Once completed the park and pavilion will be a showcase of Rotary's contributions to Bozeman over the last 100 years. By installing this facility in Bozeman's most used park we are guaranteeing that it will benefit the public for years to come as continued improvements are made. The Bozeman Rotary Clubs are committed to the clean-up of its location, adding infrastructure and more activities for all abilities, and are working in conjunction with various city, county, and state agencies to provide beautification to this recreational park. We are supported by local Rotarians, volunteers, and donors. If you recognize the contribution and enjoyment this pavilion will give throughout the year we ask that you please consider a donation toward the construction of our Centennial pavilion as it is a vital part of the park's future.

The Rotary Centennial Pavilion will facilitate expansion of the park on the southern end. This southern expansion will ease the park's crowding, will greatly enhance access for users of limited mobility, will improve safety and mitigate environmental impact. The Rotary Centennial Pavilion will be a superb family-oriented attraction and will serve to promote all Rotary has done in Bozeman.




