Past President Lisa Rasin approached the Village of Downers Grove to inquire about what they needed most to help with COVID-19. Cleaning supplies and KN95 masks what was the answer we received. Our club reached out to the community seeking donations of cleaning supplies. Kent Ebersold, another past president was able to secure 4000 KN95 masks from a vendor in St Louis, MO. The original plan was for the Rotary Club of Downers Grove and the Village of Downers Grove to split the cost and divide the amount of KN95 masks. Two thousand masks would be distributed to Good Samaritan Hospital, a Level One Trauma Center and the remaining balance will be given to the first responder of the Village of Downers Grove. When the masks arrived and were attempted to be delivered to Good Samaritan Hospital, hospital staff refused the shipment. There wasn't really a definitive answer to why but the research we found was that the hospital's desired N95 masks 1) have slightly stronger breathability standards.

The Village of Downers Grove didn't have as strict guidelines as Good Samaritan Hospital and accepted the entire shipment to be distributed to their first responders.
