#### **AVID**

#### **Advancement Via Individual Determination**

AVID's mission is to close the achievement gap by preparing all students for college readiness and success in a global society.

#### Welcome

AVID in Orange County was initially implemented in 1992 in one high school. AVID has since expanded to 250 schools, 132 elementary and 118 middle and high schools from 18 districts. Currently AVID serves approximately 30,000 students in Orange County. Of the 1,888 seniors that graduated in 2018, 92% met the four year college entrance requirements and 88% applied to 4-year universities with 75% being accepted.

#### What is AVID?

AVID is offered as an elective course that, like any other class, meets regularly. Each week, students receive two hours of instruction, two hours in tutor led study groups, and one hour in motivational activities and academic survival skills, including critical reading and writing skills. AVID students are encouraged to take prep courses (in middle school) and move into honors/advanced placement courses and/or International Baccalaureate. AVID seniors may receive University of California a-g elective credit upon completion of the AVID Seminar class.

#### **AVID Student Profile**

The AVID student is a student with academic potential:

- Average-to-high test scores
- 2.0-3.5 GPA
- College potential with support
- Desire and determination

The AVID student meets one or more of the following criteria:

- First in family to attend college
- Historically least served in four-year colleges (e.g., underrepresented as a racial or ethnic group)
- Low income
- Special circumstances (e.g., foster youth)
