1. Briefly describe the project outcomes. What was done (in 100 words or less)? The Be Somebody Program is for youth, age 8-17, that have been referred to the program. In a 4 week long, on consecutive Saturdays, 90 minute therapy sessions of 4-6 youth, a mentors, an equine specialists and a therapy trained rescue horse pursue a journey of self discovery. These session focus on improving emotional awareness, decreasing anger, anxiety, depression and post traumatic stress as well as the formation of healthy attachments and therapeutic alliances.

The evaluation process for each youth is completed using the Goal Attainment Scaling (GAS) Method.

Last year the Rotary Club of North Scottsdale granted Reigning Grace Ranch the gift of \$4320.00 to use for the scholarship of 24 students into our equine mentorship program, Be Somebody. With these funds we were able to enroll 19 girls and 5 boys between the age range of 12-15 to participate in programming from the months of June - December, 2021. These students came from a single parent, lower socioeconomic home where the child had experienced trauma.

The Be Somebody Program integrated the use of rescued horses, trained as therapy horses and was partnered with a mentor, a trained equine specialist, and a horse. Every Saturday, for 4 weeks, groups of 2-5 children actively participated in a 90 minute session that focused on improving emotional awareness, decreasing anger, anxiety, depression, and post-traumatic stress, and the formation of healthy attachments and therapeutic alliances. Session activities included teaching children how to handle horses on the ground – including obstacle course work, vision circle round penning, relationship development, non-verbal communication, herd mentality and therapeutic riding.

Each student was evaluated utilizing, the Goal Attainment Scaling (GAS) Method because it accommodates client-specific achievement measures sensitive enough to capture changes in participant performance that are expected to occur during short intervention periods. For each participant, we created a tailored plan using the GAS tool. This scales information such as horsemanship and supporting skills – social and emotional.

Some of the goals set by the students that were scholar-shipped were as follows but not limited to:

- 1. Managing Social Anxiety when I feel like people are judging me.
- 2. Recognizing where anxiety shows up in my body and how to handle it
- 3. Becoming more confident with the horses
- 4. Becoming more present
- 5. Characteristics of a positive role model
- 6. Self-worth and importance of self
- 7. Self care
- 8. Exploring my purpose

We saw a 95% improvement of the students goals set in the Goal Attainment Scaling Method. Fourteen of the students chose to continue in the program after the initial 4 week program was completed.
