Project Title: Summer Adventure Bags of Learning Activities for Personal Wellness for Shoshone and Arapahoe Children
Project Description: Lander Rotary provided backpacks of learning activities to camp programs at Native American Camps on reservations.
Identified Needs: School teachers and the school librarian on the reservations observe that the children's engagement in personal wellness activities and reading declines over the summer for children ages 3-14 in Shoshone and Arapahoe tribes. Rotary clubs of Lander and Riverton initially worked with school personnel to develop a project which was later switched to a summer camp venue. The site for the project was changed to a summer camp for the Arapahoe tribe. This is a positive change as it permitted more interaction between club members and campers. This change did impact the items that will be purchased and that was reflected in a revised budget.

Items promoting hygiene and literacy were purchased and donated to prepare Summer Adventure Bags which were given to the students/campers.

Explain how the beneficiaries and other community members were involved?

2. Briefly describe the project. What was done and where did the project activities take place?

The items provided are selected by the Ft. Washakie school librarian with great care to ensure they are culturally sensitive and age appropriate. Examples:

- 1. Hygiene: hair brush, toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss, mirror.
- 2. Books: Age and culturally appropriate books on health
- 3. Fun activities: Bubbles to learn deep breathing exercises; beach ball to kick around for pre-school children; Frisbies and jump ropes for other children; balls; coloring books and crayons/pencils.

There is a secondary benefit to the project in providing books to the children which they can keep in their homes, instilling a sense of pride of ownership. The books support continued reading and increased connection between and people in the parental roles or caregivers. Trust relationships are supported through activities that caregivers and children can do together. Health tips (such as brushing teeth) can also be extended to the family.

3.	How many	Rotarians	participated	in this	project?	

- a. A team of three people reviewed the 2023, determined supplies, and went to businesses to obtain donations. (Two from Lander and 1 from Riverton club)
- b. 14 Rotarians (8 from Lander and 6 from Riverton) and 3 children came together to stuff 300 backpacks of supplies:
  - i. Health care items- hairbrush, tooth brush/paste, lip care, suntan lotion, water bottle
  - ii. Healthy activity- bubbles, jump rope, balls,
  - iii. Creativity: journal, coloring books, colored pencils
  - iv. Reading: Native American stories for each age group
  - v. Reading: Additional books for each age group
- c. 3 Rotarians and 3 spouses added books that arrived late on a second bag stuffing night
- 4. What did they do? Please give at least two examples.
  - a. The core team of three previewed books and chose books, designed bag contents, ordered all supplies, arranged the service day, made contact with the Arapahoe tribe and established a distributions site (day camp), deliver bags.
  - b. Service day 1: 300 bags were stuffed. 100 bags per age group. Bags were then transported back to a Rotarian's home.
  - c. Service day 2: The second service time opened and stuffed the missing books (late arrival) to all bags.
- 5. How many non-Rotarians benefited from this project? \_\_300 Arapahoe children ages 5-16.

6. Who are the beneficiaries and what is the expected long-term community impact of this project?

The immediate beneficiaries are the children who receive the summer activities bags. This year we made sure that each bag had at least one age-appropriate book written by a Native American. Ivan Posey (Wind River Reservation representative and Wyoming House of Representative) for local authors: there were no books for children by local authors. It was important to have Native American stories shared to the children. The US Forest Service provided educational materials supporting education about the land and local animals. The intent of this project is to provide children with reading activities, journalling activities, and their own toothbrush/hairbrush to promote healthy activities. Immediate impact was the sheer joy on the children's faces and the sharing of thank yous. However, as a summer activity gift for children a formal long-term follow-up was not included in this project.

13. What worked well on this project and why?

This was the third year of this project. We increased from 100 bags to 300 backpacks. Thus, the core three people worked really well and had strong relationships and trust to get all items ordered and set up the day for stuffing backpacks. We also used the same space to stuff the backpacks; thus we had good organization. Distribution through the established day camp and allowing grandmothers to bring backpacks to those she cares for went very well.

14. What did not work well and how would you suggest improving it?

Finding an ideal location for distribution of the backpacks on the reservation always takes longer than anticipated. This year we wanted to provide backpacks to the Arapahoe children as we had gifted Summer Activities bags to the Shoshoni children for two years. Thus, we needed to cultivate new relationships which took time and patience.

15. How was this project publicized?

This project was promoted in both the Lander and Riverton Rotary clubs. As this is a gift project for children and upholding the traditions of the Arapahoe and Shoshoni people, the distribution was not publicized.
