Objective is to improve the long term food security and livelihoods of vulnerable young women in Valley of 1000 Hills region through sustainable micro-agriculture. The objective is to train 60 unemployed young women, out of school – aged 18 – 30 - to propagate seedlings for sale within their communities in 6 groups of 10 trainees per group over a two year period. This will improve their Food Security – to plant their own vegetables and fruit Empower Women - through skills and business training – and thereby break down gender norms and stereotypes The project will benefit 60 women and their families which can number an average 7 per household

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

The Valley of 1000 Hills Community is an impoverished region in KZN with a high level of HIV / AIDS infections. Unemployment is extremely high. Through our 1000 Survival Gardens Project and HACT's Community Gardens Project there is a need for seedling propagation to supply seasonal vegetable seedlings to the community. Young women are particularly at high risk of HIV / AIDS infection for a myriad reasons which include unemployment and poverty. This project will provide 60 young women aged 18 to 30 with the skills to propagate seedlings, provide food security for themselves and their families whilst empowering the women with skills and business training to also earn an income and thereby strengthen their decision making power within their families and communities

How did your project team identify these needs?

The current unemployment rate stands at 34,4% with Youth aged 15-24 at 64.4% and 25 -34 at 42.9%.

Through our projects and that of HACT in the community we have a need for the production of the seedlings and this project will enable us to train 60 young women to cultivate and sell their seedlings to a captured market of our homestead and community gardens

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

The Gogos in the community are already running community and homestead gardens but have to incur costs to travel to purchase seasonal seedlings. A local source within the community will thus save time and costs to obtain the required seedlings

How were community members involved in planning the project?

The Gogos are already currently purchasing the seeds and seedlings and have identified the need for seedlings to be obtained from within their community

Briefly describe the other initiatives and how they relate to this project.

Together with RC Winnipeg, RC Gibsons and the Roll A Hippo Foundation all Canadian based we established the "1000 Survival Gardens Project" for the distribution of "Survival Garden Kits" which consists of a hippo roller (to convey water), garden tools / equipment, seeds, seedlings to families and communities to establish homestead and community gardens. HACT through its outreach program in the Valley of 1000 Hills, already run 36 large scale community gardens and various homestead gardens.

Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.

The program includes the following training aspects:

- i) Micro Horticulture for seedling production
- ii) Vegetable gardening
- ii) Women's Health and wellbeing training
- iii) IMpower Empowerment and Self defence - gender based violence prevention training course
- iv) Basic business skills training

The above will empower these women to become economically active and give them a greater voice within their communities and households

How were these needs identified?

Through our "1000 Survival Gardens Project" we have provided the community with garden equipment. Gogos (Grandmothers) from HACT's Community and homestead garden projects. HACT's Youth facilitators and Gogo Community Field Officers have identified the need for locally produced seeds and seedlings - all year round. Currently they have to travel to obtain the seedlings which requires transport and costs. This gives us the opportunity to engage and train younger women who are at risk of HIV contraction to be trained and empowered to earn an income and be more positively engaged within their community. This project brings the seedling supply into the heart of the community, retains the economic growth within the community - whilst empowering the younger women within the community.

They will obtain the training, the equipment required to get them started and certificates will be issued as they complete the various phases of their training.

Thereafter they will be mentored to ensure the sustainability of the project.

HACT will maintain their mentorship and guidance after the completion of the grant funded activities as they will form part of the HACT Community garden program

By selling the seedlings the young entrepreneurs will earn an income to replenish stock and maintain the equipment. They will also have an ongoing relationship with HACT's Nursery and Field monitors to assist and guide with any stock replenishment and / or repairs.

I confirm and agree to the following:

6. TRF reserves the right to cancel the grant and/or this Agreement without notice upon the failure of either or both of the Sponsors to abide by the terms set forth in this Agreement and the Terms and Conditions. Upon cancellation, TRF shall be entitled to a refund of any global grant funds, including any interest earned, that have not been expended.

7. The laws of the State of Illinois, USA, without reference to its conflicts of laws principles, shall govern all matters arising out of or relating to this Agreement, including, without limitation, its interpretation, construction, performance, and enforcement.

8. Any legal action brought by either party against the other party arising out of or relating to this Agreement must be brought in either, the Circuit Court of Cook County, State of Illinois, USA or the Federal District Court for the Northern District of Illinois, USA.
